

## MR LEON LOUW

Leon Louw is a well-known South African personality in the fields of economics and law. He has been active in diverse aspects of public life, and is credited with having had a significant impact on the course of events in South Africa, regarding extensive economic reforms. Since its inception he has played a major role in the Free Market Foundation, of which he is Executive Director.

He originally qualified as a lawyer, but as he practised law the field of economics became his major interest.

Mr Louw is one of South Africa's most highly regarded political analysts and forecasters. He brings economics, legal issues and prevailing social realities together with a scientific analytical approach. As a result he has achieved a reputation for having been uncannily accurate in his predictions. Leon Louw has spoken and lectured in 25 countries, including being a guest speaker for a number of the world's most prestigious organisations. He has given guest lectures, or debated with scholarly opponents, at all of South Africa's universities, and has been consulted by many governments, corporations and political parties.

Leon Louw had a long standing interest in the economic and regulatory frameworks electricity production, with particular interest in nuclear power.

He frequently comments in the local and foreign media, and also on radio and TV. He is also a regular speaker at public events.

He has written a number of books; including: *SA: The Solution*; and *Let the People Govern* (written together with his wife Frances Kendall). *The Solution* has been republished in various countries, including the USA and Canada, and not long after publication *The Solution* had sold more copies and had more reprints than any other book on South African issues.

He has served in a primary role on numerous study and advisory panels, and has been consulted by more than a dozen governments, as diverse as; Kenya, Russia, China, Malta, Ghana, Hungary and Surinam.
